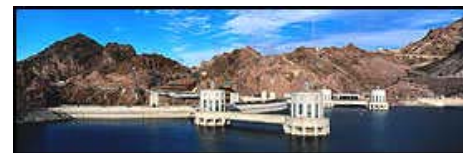

• A quick look at the Points of Interest

Old Las Vegas Sign: The historical location of the first Mormon Fort in the Valley.

• The Railroad Pass Hotel & Casino, This is the first casino built in Nevada. It was here in the 1930's during the construction of the "Hoover Dam" that all the workers went for entertainment, gambling and fine food. Boulder City was located on Federal land and, at this time, no gambling or drinking was allowed.

• Boulder City: Boulder city is on the National Register for Historical Sites. This is the only city in Nevada which still does not allow gambling.

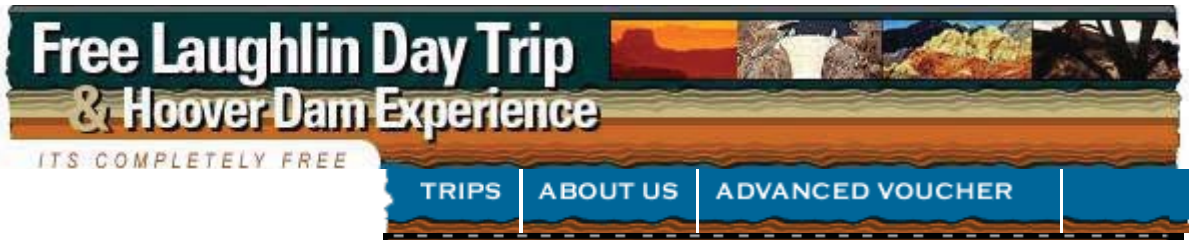
• Lake Mead: One of the largest man made lakes in the United States with over 550 miles of shore line.

• Hoover Dam: This is also commonly referred to as Boulder Dam and was built between 1931 and 1935. Enough cement was used in its construction to build a 2-lane highway from Los Angeles to New York City. Unfortunately 96 men lost their lives in the construction of the dam.

• Laughlin: Located on the Nevada side of the Colorado River across from Bullhead City, Arizona. Laughlin was founded by Don Laughlin who built the first major Hotel/Casino there named: Riverside Hotel/Casino. He also paid for construction of the bridge which connects both sides of the river.

• CAL-NEV-ARI: Named after the 3 states of California, Nevada and Arizona

• Searchlight, Nevada: Searchlight is a gold and silver mining community of the past. Today, there is a large gold mine 7 miles west of town.



Here's a quick look at the Points of Interest of the Stateline trip

1. Las Vegas Strip: The tour starts with narration explaining briefly the history of the Hotel/Casinos that have become renowned worldwide. Over 500 million visitors have experienced Las Vegas since the 1960's. Points of interest will include: Circus Circus, Riviera, Stardust, Desert Inn, Frontier, Treasure Island, Mirage, Venetian, Caesars Palace, Imperial Palace, Flamingo Hilton, Bally's, Paris, Aladdin, Bellagio, Monte Carlo, New York New York, MGM Grand, Excalibur, Luxor, Mandalay Bay, and Tropicana.
2. University of Las Vegas (UNLV): Was officially established in 1957 with the construction of Maud Frazier Hall. Through hard work and determination, civic leaders and community members have helped form a center of academic excellence in southern Nevada for generations to experience.
Despite its short history, UNLV has seen dramatic growth in all areas. More than 140 graduate and undergraduate programs are now offered to more than 20,000 students on a 335 acre campus. All programs are fully accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, and many programs have received further accreditation from independent national bodies.
Thomas and Mack Center (1983): This 18,500/seat multipurpose events center is the site for "Running Rebel" basketball games, semiprofessional ice-hockey events, headliner concerts, the National Finals Rodeo, and various ice performance shows. It houses the administrative offices of the department of intercollegiate athletics, the center's operating staff, the athletic development office, and the Rebel Store. The T&M has established a sense of home to the Las Vegas community.
3. Ethel M Chocolate Factory: Forrest Mars Sr. started making chocolates in 1911 and became the world's leading manufacturer of "snacks". His accomplishments include Mars Incorporated. After retirement in 1976 Mr. Mars went on to design a new line of gourmet chocolates that included various alcohol's as a base. "Ethel M. Chocolates" was named after his mother, Ethel Mars. Daily tours of this factory, as well as the "Cactus Garden" are included in this (1) hour stop. Gourmet chocolates are also available for purchase during this visit.
